What an incredibly busy half-term it has been at Soar Valley College! Our students have been actively engaging in a wide range of exciting activities, showcasing their creativity and school spirit.

Children In Need

As part of our support for Children in Need, all students attended house assemblies. During these assemblies students had the chance to learn more about this important cause and had the opportunity to strengthen their sense of belonging to their houses. It also allowed our newest Heads of House – Mr. Megginson, Miss Evans, Mr. Cherrington, and Mr. Badshah – to formally introduce themselves to their respective houses.

Additionally, the assemblies provided a platform to promote the various Children in Need Fair activities and Wear What You Want Day which were planned to raise money for this worthy cause.

Our students demonstrated incredible enthusiasm and teamwork by participating in a range of exciting activities during the Children in Need Fair. The Castle Welly Wanging competition saw Abbey House take the top spot as Jay 11.7 threw the welly 18.80 metres. This made him the overall winner for the second consecutive year! Abbey House also claimed victory in the Abbey Ping Pong Pursuit, which showcased students' ability to think tactically and use their hand-eye coordination. In Bradgate's Guess How Many Sweets Are in The Jar competition Victoria House secured first place as Tyga-Lilly 7.5 used her critical thinking skills to guess that there were exactly 88 sweets! Overall, both the CIN Fair and the Wear What You Want Day were a huge success. It was a wonderful display of our school's commitment to supporting others. In total, Soar Valley managed to raise an incredible £1257 for Children in Need. This generous amount will make a real difference to children across the country.



House Emblem Design Competition

Our students have also been involved in a variety of creative and competitive activities recently. In the House Emblem Design competition, Beacon House triumphed with a fantastic winning design from Saakshavi 10.2 who displayed her incredible artistic abilities. Additionally, for Black History Month, students took part in a meaningful competition where they had to research and create a poster about an influential Black person. Grace 7.5 steered Castle House to success and earned first place for her innovative and thought-provoking work. These events not only highlight our students' talents but also their commitment to their houses and to celebrating diversity.

Bake off Competition

In another highlight, our students from Years 7, 8, and 9 flaunted their culinary talents in the DT Bake Off competition. Ramsha 7.9 and Maryam 7.3 seized first place for Bradgate House. Their beautifully decorated cupcakes not only demonstrated impressive baking skills but also attention to detail. This further showcased the range of house competitions on offer to our students. Football finesse!

A group of Year 9 students took part in a fantastic opportunity led by Matt Piper's FSD Academy. The group thoroughly enjoyed showing off their football skills in a training session and they were excellent ambassadors for the college.

They also had the opportunity to learn more about studying sport at Post 16. In conjunction with Loughborough University, they created their own sports drinks and they all agreed that they were very flavourful.

Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths [STEM] Day

On Wednesday 11th December Hyett Education came into school to work with our students on their robotics, programming and engineering skills. The students had a fabulous experience.

Year 9 and Year 8 took part in workshops where they looked at how artificial intelligence is linked to machines and had the opportunity to build robots and programme them to carry out specific tasks. They also took part in the Defence Nuclear Engineering workshops that enabled students to build and code robots to complete a range of missions linked to various STEM themes. The challenges encouraged teamwork, problem-solving, creative thinking and coding/cyber skills.

Year 10 were involved in an Advanced STEMbotics session. The workshop challenged students to design, build, and code LEGO robots using Python, a powerful text-based programming language.

Year 10 learned core coding principles such as sequencing, selection, and iteration. They engaged in hands-on robotics projects, building and programming robots to solve challenges. This workshop enabled them to apply the knowledge and skills they have from their computer science lessons.

Year 7 students that took part in our Drone Coding workshop learned to code the flight patterns of their drones using block programming or the Swift coding language, the same technology used to develop apps on iPhone and iPad.

The students created algorithms for their drones, enabling them to take off, land, perform flips and rolls, and navigate various altitudes and distances. They programmed their drones to safely manoeuvre through a course or execute a coordinated routine, developing practical coding skills along the way.

The whole day was designed to help students develop problem-solving and computational thinking skills while gaining experience with tools used in real-world STEM careers. It was a fun and engaging way to introduce programming, bridging the gap between visual programming and more advanced techniques. It was a memorable experience for all students involved.

It is a safe, anonymous app where users can talk about absolutely anything from anxiety to autism, dating to depression, or self-harm to self-esteem. Throughout the day we had 13 local Primary Schools attend and over 150 pupils getting to experience the excitement of wheelchair basketball. We had 12 of our Year 11 Sports Leaders on hand throughout the day who did a fantastic job of ensuring the event ran smoothly and all the primary school pupils had a day to remember.

Primary Festivals

This half term has been a busy one for our Year 10 Sport Leaders. We have had 4 primary school festivals - hockey, tag rugby, Key Stage 1 multisport and Key Stage 2 multisport. Each of these have given the pupils of Mellor, Rushey Mead, Sandfield, Taylor Road and Wyvern primary schools the chance experience a competitive sporting event at Soar Valley whilst developing their skills and having lots of fun.

In total we have had 35 Sports Leaders taking part in the running of these events who have also been developing their skills. They are becoming more and more confident with every event they are involved in and growing into a great set of leaders – well done all.

Geography Lecture

On the 20th of November Year 11 GCSE geography students were invited to attend a lecture on climate change hosted by the Geographical Association at The University of Nottingham.

This was a hugely enriching experience, delving into some of the concepts that are illustrated throughout the GCSE geography course; it further aided our understanding of the geography by showcasing the interconnectedness of several subtopics within the course.

Despite being a university lecture it was accessible to the students and we came away with the clear idea



that we do not live on the Earth as individuals but as a collective body whose daily actions greatly impact the environment from a local through to a global scale. Issues highlighted in the lecture focused on drought, flooding and global warming; however, there was an optimistic element as it also revealed the ideas which must be implemented by governments in large scale projects, as well as more personal initiatives we could get involved with to sustain the Earth for future generations.

The lecture strengthened my desire to study A Level geography and exposed me a broad range of careers that might stem from studying geography at university. Thank you to the geography department for organising it.

Geography GIS Club

GIS, or Geographical Information Systems, is a technology used to create, manage, analyse, and map all types of data. The new geography GIS club has got off to a flying start this term with many Year 7 students taking the opportunity to have hands-on experience with multiple GIS applications travelling the world and manipulating data sets using the classroom smart board.

The students have journeyed from a rainy SVC to a nighttime view of Death Valley in California and a view over the developing skyline in Dubai. Students have experimented with various basemaps to see 3D models of different locations to appreciate some of the potential that is available through studying geography and the cutting-edge technology involved in the ever developing field of GIS.

Interfaith Event at City of Leicester College

On 19th November twelve Soar Valley students from Years 8 and 9 joined students from The City of Leicester College and St Paul's Catholic School for an afternoon celebrating *Interfaith Week*, at The City of Leicester College.

Interfaith Week is a national programme designed to increase understanding and awareness of different religions and worldviews that exist in the UK. Students spent their time asking questions of a variety of representatives from local communities, including Buddhists, Christians, Hindus, Humanists and Muslims, learning about key practices and delving into beliefs around God and the afterlife.


